monotypic

Harlequin Ducks breed on mountain streams and rivers of Kamchatka, the Kuril Is, Alaska, nw. N America, and in ne. Canada, Greenland and Iceland, and they withdraw S in winter to coastal shorelines of Japan, California, and the mid-Atlantic states (Dement'ev and Gladkov 1952, Cramp and Simmons 1977, AOU 1998). It is a vagrant to n. Mexico and the *Northwestern Hawaiian Islands*, where there are six records involving nine individuals. The earliest record was of a first-spring female collected on *Laysan* 17 Apr 1906 (Bailey 1956; BPBM 4538; <u>HRBP</u> 5652-5654 of specimen). Five individuals have been recorded on *Midway*, one observed during April 1976 including on Eastern I 9 Apr (*E* 38:7), a first-fall male observed on Sand I 29 Nov 1982 that was found dead 30 Nov (BPBM 161201; <u>HRBP</u> 5652-5654 of specimen), a first-fall female observed on Sand I 17-29 Nov 1999 that was found dead on the latter date (BPBM 184293; <u>HRBP</u> 5652-5654 of specimen; *AB* 54:108), and two observed on Sand I in Dec 2006 (<u>HRBP</u> 5415 published *NAB* 61:163). The 1999 bird was erroneously attributed to Sand I, O'ahu, by Engilis et al. (2004). On *Kure*, three females were observed 31 Oct-1Nov 2011, one of which was photographed (<u>HRBP</u> 6020).

We follow Pyle (2008) in considering this species monotypic; specimens from the Hawaiian Islands have been assigned to a synonymized Pacific N American subspecies, "*H.h. pacificus*".
