monotypic

Stilt Sandpipers breed in the tundra of Alaska and n. Canada (E to Ontario) and winter primarily from Mexico to S America (AOU 1998). Vagrants have reached Europe, the Galapagos Is, Japan, and Australia (Cramp and Simmons 1983, Higgins and Davies 1996). There are two substantiated records for the *Southeastern Hawaiian Islands*. One was observed at the Ki'i Unit of JCNWR, *O'ahu* 19-21 Sep 2002 (HRBP 5044, 5173-5176, published *NAB* 57:135) and another was at the Kona (Kealakehe) WTP, *Hawai'i I* 6-11 Sep 2014 (HRBP 6476-6479, published *NAB* 69:514). A report of two near Kahuku, O'ahu 6 Sep 1953 (*E* 14:33) is likely in error, and a desiccated corpse of a shorebird thought to be a Stilt Sandpiper, found on O'ahu in 1977, was sent to the USNM where it proved to be a Wandering Tattler (S. Olson, pers. comm.).
