## non-breeding visitor, vagrant

L. c. kamtschatschensis L. c. brachyurus

The Mew Gull is a polytypic species with distinct breeding populations in Alaska (L. c. brachyurus), Siberia (kamtschatschensis), and n. Europe (canus); in the Pacific region, brachyurus winters S to California and kamtschatschensis to se. Asia (Dement'ev and Gladkov 1951c, Cramp and Simmons 1983, AOU 1998, Howell and Dunn 2007). The first record from the Hawaiian Islands involves a specimen of a first-winter female found dead on Kure, Northwestern Hawaiian Islands, 22 Feb 1963 (USNM 493343; HRBP 5117-5122). It was originally reported as a Ring-billed Gull (Clapp and Woodward 1968, Sibley and McFarlane 1968, Woodward 1972) but was re-identified as a Mew Gull by R.B. Clapp in 1983, and as kamtschatschensis by further examination of the specimen (PP, contra AOU 1998; HRBP 5117-5122 of specimen). Over 50 years passed before the next Mew Gulls were recorded in the Northwestern Islands: an adult and first-cycle bird together on Kure 31 Oct 2015 (HRBP 6597), the first-cycle bird remaining until 2 Dec, followed by an adult on *Midway* 5 Nov 2015 (HRBP 6598-6600), quite possibly the same bird as the Kure adult. The following year two more first-cycle Mew Gulls occurred on Midway, one 6 Nov through the end of 2016 (HRBP 6601-6604) and a second found dead 15 Nov 2016 (HRBP 6605-6608). All five of these Mew Gulls on Kure and Midway in 2015-2016 appear to be of *kamtschatschensis*. In the Southeastern Hawaiian Islands, another Mew Gull showed up in 2015, an adult present at the Honouliuli Unit of PHNWR, O'ahu 1 Jan-6 Apr 2015 (HRBP 6593-6596; published NAB 69:515). This individual shows characteristics of the North American subspecies brachyurus.
